The 2026 Clarence Jazz Festival will honour its roots while looking boldly to the future, with an exciting program that brings together homegrown talent, and acclaimed artists from across the country and overseas.

The 30-year anniversary program will celebrate the diversity of jazz in all its forms, from smooth and soulful to bold and experimental, coupled with funk and blues acts, while embracing the relaxed, open-air atmosphere that makes the festival so unique.

Audiences can expect performances in scenic locations, family-friendly twilight sessions, late-night gigs for the jazz diehards and a few special surprises along the way.



FROM YOUR MAYOR

Mayor's message

AS WE STEP INTO A NEW YEAR, I BELIEVE CLARENCE IS ENTERING A PERIOD OF EXTRAORDINARY RENEWAL, ONE THAT WILL RESHAPE THE HEART OF OUR CITY AND STRENGTHEN THE IDENTITY OF THE EASTERN SHORE.

This year marks the beginning of major transformation across our community, led by our newly adopted City Heart Plan. This ambitious vision will guide the revitalisation of key precincts including Rosny CBD, Bellerive Village, Art and Culture Precinct, the Council Chambers, Sheoak Point, Kangaroo Bay and Warrane. By creating stronger connections between these areas, the Plan will deliver greener, more welcoming public spaces, safer and more vibrant streets, and destinations that invite people to gather, relax and explore.

As a community, we've dealt with some big issues over recent years – issues which have divided opinions and somewhat divided us as a community. As a state, we are still dealing with some of these issues. I believe one of the greatest opportunities the City Heart Plan presents is to unify the eastern shore through actions that will benefit all and provide economic and wellbeing benefits to generations of residents.

The Plan will begin with a series of early projects designed to set the tone for what's ahead, uplifting public spaces, enhancing pathways and access, and improving the places where people already live, work and spend time. Each initiative is a step toward a more connected city centre, one that reflects the aspirations of our community and celebrates Clarence's unique character.

In a huge boost to achieving the objectives of the Plan, we were successful in securing a \$1.67 million Australian Government grant through the Urban Precincts and Partnerships Program. This funding will allow for the planning, community engagement and design of our Rosny Farm Arts and Culture Precinct – a major step in achieving the Plan's concepts for the Rosny Parklands.

There are other City Heart projects commencing within the Parklands, with the construction of the 1.7km circuit track, and our project to rewild Rosny Parklands which includes the removal of

'woody weeds' – invasive weeds that don't naturally grow in the area – and the development of an ecological restoration plan. These are two important steps in establishing the Wild Park area of the Parklands.

The year ahead offers us an exciting opportunity to reimagine our city, to create places that inspire connection and celebrate the natural beauty and lifestyle that make this side of the river so special. I look forward to sharing this journey with you as we begin bringing this vision to life.

Here's to a year of renewal, confidence and momentum for our city.

Shaping the future of Clarence


We're updating our **Strategic Plan 2021-2031**, and we want your help to shape the future of Clarence.

Mastering our master plans

What is a master plan?

The approval of a master plan is an important step to progress projects for a place, space, park or sporting venue. It will often bring to life an idea which has been shaped through talking with the community, and gets people excited about what's to come. But sometimes, from the community's perspective, after they've been completed, master plans sit there, and nothing seems to happen quickly. So, what is a master plan, what do they do, and what are they for?

A master plan is a vision for how an area could look in the future. It is not the detailed design you need to start building, instead, it sets the direction for how the area should be developed.

A master plan is created because we want these ideas to come to life one day, but there are many steps to work through before a project can be delivered.

To give an example, last November, the Little Howrah Beach Master Plan was finalised. For Little Howrah Beach to look like the pictures in the Plan several steps must first be taken. Surveys and site assessments need to be completed, detailed landscape plans and building designs drawn up, development applications approved, and hiring a contractor, to name a few. However, the biggest hurdle to complete a project is money and staff resourcing.

Our approximate yearly capital budget for 'passive recreation' projects like Little Howrah Beach sits at around \$2.4 million. That sounds like a lot, but this budget also must cover the renewal of existing play grounds, walking paths, and open spaces right across Clarence,

as well as the development of any new projects. To give that budget a bit of context, the construction of the Bellerive Beach Park cost around \$5 million.

Why create a master plan without the money?

Sometimes developing a master plan can feel like putting the cart before the horse. Even without funding, we need a master plan to guide what happens in an area to avoid development in an uncoordinated way. However, in order to get the funding required, we need to put together a master plan.

When putting in budget requests each year, or seeking funding from Tasmanian or Australian Government, the question is always asked 'what will the money be used for?'. Having a master plan provides a clear explanation of the project and gives us a much better chance to secure funding.

When we create a master plan, we also speak with the community to get feedback, which raises awareness and expectations about the project. The time between developing a master plan and getting the money to build can be several years, and during this time, it can seem as though not much is happening. However, in the background we are working on detailed designs and seeking various approvals required to deliver elements of the master plan.

A master planning process is a very important step to make sure an area is well planned, properly funded and built in a coordinated

way, but they take time. Importantly, master plans are a key consultation tool to ensure our community is engaged with each project and has input into the final outcome.



